'Tis the (Flu) Season

The Marion County Health Department will offer flu shots for \$15.00 this year; call 221-2121 for a list of sites (Medicare and Medicaid accepted). MedCheck East, at 1703 N. The Centers for Disease Control recommends that the following groups of people receive the flu vaccination: children between the ages of 6 months and 19 years, pregnant women, people over the age of 50, people living in nursing homes or assisted living facilities, and people who live with or care for those at risk for complications from flu.

22nd Annual Bob Gregory Coats for Kids Giveaway

The 2008 Coats for Kids distribution will take place from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 11, in the Northwest Pavilion at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. It is free and open to the public. Any child who needs a coat will receive one. Bilingual (Spanish) volunteers will also be onsite to assist non-English speaking families. An adult must accompany all children, and there is a limit of one coat per child. Children must be present in order to receive a coat. No proof of income/address is required, and no referrals are required. In 2007, Coats for Kids distributed more than 8,000 coats to children in Central Indiana. Early Voting

Marion County election officials expect extremely heavy turnout on Election Day this year (November 4); voters may wish to consider their early voting options in order to avoid long lines at polling places. Early voting begins at the clerk's office (200 E. Washington Street) on Monday, October 6, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; these hours will continue weekdays through November 2. On November 3, the last day to vote before Election Day, early voting at the clerk's office ends at noon. The clerk's office is also open for voting from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 25; Saturday, November 1; and Sunday, November 2. Two satellite locations will be open for early voting this year: Southport High School and North Central High School. Voting at these locations begins on October 23 and runs through November 2, and the hours are 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. For more information, call 327-VOTE.
